Reflections from Chaplain Jerry C'Connor ...

We humans collect all kinds of things; collecting begins in early childhood, and represent things we treasure, and can't seem to part with. When I first came to Plymouth Harbor, as chaplain, I learned that two of our residents collected elephants, not the kind you have to feed and clean up after, but the kind you display in a case — one collection was the result of world travels, the other representing a political persuasion. Some collections cannot be displayed, but they are very present in our lives.

At our recent Celebration of Life service I spoke on The Elephant in the Room; I was prompted to do this by a story about the death of Charles Anthony, a conservationist in South Africa, who with his wife spent years studying elephants. It was just a few days after his death, when his wife looked out and about 20 elephants had gathered outside the house and stood in vigil for the death of their friend. After three days, they returned to their home territory. At the Celebration of Life service we invited family members, of both Plymouth Harbor and community patients who died in Smith Care Center, to light a candle in memory of their loved one. Each family member and Plymouth Harbor neighbors are like the elephants in the story, gathered together for a time of remembering, celebrating, and supporting each other.

There are many elephants in the *rooms* we occupy in life; elephants that intrude on us, take up more space than we would like; they are invisible, but can be named: age, failing health, fear of dying, financial worries, family issues, loss of control — the list is endless. They impact everything we do; there can be more than one in our room. We wish they would go away, but they don't go. Living with them requires naming them; they may be like relatives we don't particularly like, but they are part of our lives, and we can learn to live with them. It is amazing how acceptance of what we cannot change changes our lives for the better. It's sort of like realizing you may have troubles in your life, but your trouble is nowhere as challenging as what someone else may struggle with.

Faith, be it in God according to Judeo/Christian tradition, or in a spiritual presence found in other religions of the world, each of us uses prayer, meditation, mantras, and other practices to deal with the elephants that seem to encroach on our space. Elephants in the room cannot be avoided, but are friends who stand in vigil through *calm and stormy waters*, assuring us we are not alone in our journey. Give thanks, collect a lot of elephants, welcome them into your life, and celebrate the strength they give you in moments of weakness and strength.

You probably expect a nagging letter from the

Conservation Committee and usually that is what you get. But this time we have a surprise for you. The Nag Committee would like, (try not to faint), to thank you for the huge changes most of you have made in the way you use our resources.

The change that is easiest to measure is the big increase in the amount of "stuff" that is being recycled. You have seen those overflowing bins. All of that is material that can be recycled into something useable. And it is not going into the landfills to pollute one hundred years from now. The word from Bruce and Jeanne is that we are saving about 40% more than we used to. One plea. Please recycle only recyclables. There is not much use for old boots. They, and broken glass, are trash. But hurray for all of you for the amazing increase.

And then there is the fall in the use of electricity. A long-term graph shows that we, both staff and residents, are using less power. The line is going down. Part of this is the change to LED lights after the

remodeling, part of it is the switch by most of you to compact fluorescent light bulbs and the rest, we suspect, is that we residents are more careful about turning off lights. So that deserves a second hurray.

The word from Liz in the laundry is that she is washing fewer towels since we have started leaving our dirty towels in the tub. The housekeepers are being careful not to take clean towels to be washed. So thanks to the housekeepers and all of you.

Several of you have reminded us that we should print every month the peak hours when electricity costs more. This many not save power but it does save money. In February and March, try to use power-hungry appliances in the middle of the day. Peak hours are Monday through Friday from 6 AM to 10 AM and from 6 PM to 10 PM. Weekends also are cheaper. So thank you for this too.


The help we have received from John Batchelder and the rest of the administration has been huge. Nothing substantial can happen without them.


